Fourth of July Tour - July 1-3

On Friday, July 1st, the tour began with registration from 1:00 PM until 4:00 PM. For those arriving late, there was a second registration between 7:30 and 8:00 PM. Manning the registration desk in *Templin's* Main Lobby were Jean Almeda, Helen Rachuy, and Sharon Mullins. Registration packets containing tickets for breaks, lunches, riverboat tour, and banquet were made available to tour participants. Everyone one of the western states had a representative.

The registration packet contained an envelope for each tour member. Inside the envelope was a \$2.00 bill. Tour participants could spend the two dollars or hang on to it until the banquet, in hopes of trading it for a larger denomination if the bill's serial number was drawn during the banquet.

The tour's Hospitatlity Room was located on the first floor of the main building. Norma Skidmore, Karen Miller, Hazel Whitley, and Janice Hutchinson provided food and drink items to participants over the two-days of the tour. Most participants noted that these ladies had provided the best hospitality room they had encountered, anywhere.

Saturday, July 2nd a driver's meeting was held promptly at 8:15 AM in the main parking lot by Day 1 chairmen Allen McSweeney and his co-chairman Ada Biddle.

The tour headed out from Templin's and followed side roads into Coeur d'Alene and ended at our morning break at Coffeeville. There, we were treated to coffee, tea, juice, donuts, and mountains of other goodies.

From Coffeeville, we were off to a complete circuit of Hayden Lake. There were some minor hills around the lake but nothing really steep. There were two 'Rescue Ranger' trucks following the tour. Manning 'Ranger 1' were Glen and Hazel Whitley. 'Ranger 2' was manned by Rockey and Steve Rachuy. If major problems were encountered, the 'Rangers' would help you get safely off the road and would call for a tow vehicle if necessary. 'Body by Scotty' kept a tow vehicle on



standby for the two tour days and would haul cars back to the Templin's parking lot if that was required.

The pavilion at the Coeur d'Alene park and beach area was reserved for the afternoon. A catered lunch was served at the pavilion. The pavilion was ideally located for a walking tour of the beach, marina, resort, and the shops downtown. We also secured a parking area across the street from the pavilion.
