



The November meeting minutes were approved as printed in the Fender Chatter.

Ideas such as raising dues to \$20.00, reducing the costs of the Fender Chatter by cutting down on colored ink used, accepting donations, getting the newsletter online and mailing it out only to recipients specifically requesting it by mail, contacting *lifetime* members and discontinue copies going out to those who don't care to receive them any longer, and work on fund raising projects were among the possibilities discussed. It seemed the majority in attendance felt upping our dues would be more than reasonable. In order to do this, our bylaws need to be amended which would require a majority vote after being read at two regularly scheduled meetings by the members present, provided that notice of the amendment is mailed in the notice of these meetings. Following discussion the motion was officially made to proceed with amending our bylaws to increase our dues to \$20.00 and announce this at our next two meetings, then plan to vote at our March meeting to have this amendment become effective in 2005. This motion was seconded and passed. Allen noted that he is working on getting our web page set up.

THE IMPORTANCE OF SEMINARS

Chris has been battling Hugo this past week. He wishes that modern (1960) cars were as simple as Model T's. Well, yes, but people make a lot of potentially deadly mistakes rebuilding even the simplest of all cars. We are blessed with several T gurus in our club willing to share their knowledge and give seminars. It behooves the rest of us to attend and soak up all we can so we don't wind up like those porcupines on the road that Dusty scoops up and brings home to me.

An example: Did you realize that a Model T front axle assembly with spring perches installed correctly has a front and back? If you don't, and you blithely install your front spring and your spindles, you won't be very happy with your steering performance, no matter how well you restore your gear. "Why's that?", you say. Because those darn perches are left and right hand and they're tilted to angle the front spring. Put it all together wrong and steering will be extremely unpleasant. (downright wild) Reproduction perches are clearly marked "LH" and "RH" for complete idiots— originals are not.

Not feeling quite so confident? Did you make it to the steering gear seminar? You should have. If you did, you know that the planetary gears inside those little housings are far from interchangeable. If you've emptied your collection into one great big jar and they came from multiple years, you had probably just sit down and have a good cry. I do have a little blind four-year—old in my Sunday School class that may be able to help you sort them back out. She's really tactile.
