Remembering Mike Crabb written by Jim Patterson

Well known and long time Spokane T Club member Mike Crabb passed away on June 28th, so we thought it fitting to have him be Fender Chatter's "Featured Club Member" for August. As Mike would have said, "She was only the mortician's daughter, but anyone cadaver!" Mike's prolific joke telling earned him a reputation that is widely known across the country, and everyone

had earned to buy his first car, a 1925 Chevrolet Touring, and he drove it proudly home to show his parents who weren't even aware of his plans to buy a car. He wasn't even tall enough to be able to reach the foot pedals on the floor while also seeing out over the top of the steering wheel, but somehow he managed to drive that car home to proudly show to his very surprised parents! To dress

in the T Club knows many of the "Mikeee Sez" jokes that he magically created or re-told.

Mike was very involved with antique cars all his life and his stories go back to 1948 when he was 8 year's old. He used to scrapbook by collecting magazine ads neatly cut out of National Geographics and other popular magazines of the day. He had three large scrapbooks with old car pictures, hand written notes and facts about each car, and dozens of car ads. At 14 years of age, he spent \$10.00 he



the car up, Mike hand brushed the car with green paint and it looked like a million bucks to him. He kept that car for several years and eventually sold it to get money to buy a "newer" car, and subsequently lost track of the car's where-a-bouts over the years. Now let's fast forward 64 years to 2014 - - - Mike was talking to a neighbor about all the cars he had owned over time (some 65 different cars for which he had photos and recorded purchase date of each one of

them, all hanging in a large picture framed collage on his garage wall) and he mentioned that his very first car was a '25 Chevrolet Touring. That discussion jogged his neighbor's memory and he in turn noted that a friend nearby had the same year and model car in his garage. Mike naturally rushed over to see the car that very day; and low and behold, what Mike saw in Ed Waltwebber's garage turned out to be his own original first car! How many of us could find the first car we ever owned after 64 years? Mike recently gave Ed the original title and sales receipt to the car which he had kept in his scrapbooks all these years.

After love affairs with a 1960 Sunbeam, a '57 Ford Fairlane convertible, an MGB, a 1930 Model A Coupe, and many more beautiful and unique cars, Mike and Dixie purchased a new Pontiac Tempest convertible which Dixie still has today. They purchased that car some 46 years ago, on June 8th, 1969, the day after Betty's and my wedding. A few weeks later, Betty and I joined Mike and Dixie on a weekend camping trip in their new convertible up into Canada and watched Neil Armstrong place his first footprint on the moon's surface on live black and white TV at a roadside bar.

In 1972, Mike purchased a 1915 Model T Touring and by 1975 had it restored and running. By now he was starting to take his and Dixie's two children, Jeff and Jennifer, on dozens of local Model T Club

tours, parades, campouts, and summer vacations throughout the Pacific Northwest.

Mike's adventures with the Model T were abundant, having gone on tours to the Oregon coast (2X), San Juan Islands (2X), British Columbia, Montana, northern Idaho, and National Tours to Leavenworth, WA, Portland, OR, and Post Falls, ID. Mike's T was a driver, likely putting 500 - 700 miles a year on it. However, his Model T days became numbered while on one of the Oregon coast campout tours. After camping out, he tried crank starting his T one very wet and humid morning, the car's engine back-fired, causing the crank to kick back, breaking his right fore-arm. So much for an enjoyable tour! The T Club later chose to commemorate this mishap by creating the infamous Spokane Model T Club "Broken T Award", given to each recipient of a broken arm or hand as a result of hand cranking a Model T. Mike was the first awardee, and there have been two more (Glen Whitely and Mark Hutchinson) since then.

We are reminded of a seldom discussed mishap that occurred during Jeff & Jennifer's growing up years where the kids went outside to play and then decided to climb up on the top of Dixie and Mike's Pontiac convertible. The only problem was Jeff was heavier than the fabric convertible top, and he literally fell through the top. I'm sure that all involved with that incident wish they could re-live that day to create a different outcome!

After nearly 25 years of touring with the Model T, the next (and final) antique car that Mike purchased and restored was a beautifully restored 1930 Chevrolet two-dr. Sedan. Mike was especially proud of its burgundy body with black fenders, nice Mohair upholstery, and whitewall tires! It still resides in his garage alongside the '69 Pontiac convertible and the '15 Model T; these three being the favorites of all his 61 cars he had during his lifetime.

Mike was a collector of anything old or "antique". He had a spark plug collection with over 50 different 1920's era spark plugs; a 20's era hub cap collection containing dozens of different ornate hub caps; a license plate collection of over 100 restored plates from Idaho and Washington dating back to 1916 when Washington started issuing license plates to automobiles; a wood spoked wheel collection from various old cars; and finally, a radiator shell collection featuring radiator shells from Model T, Model A, Dodge, Star, Plymouth, Essex, Chevrolet, Chrysler, Buick, Pontiac, and a dozen other antique cars. All of these collections were carefully and neatly lined up and displayed on his garage walls.

The Model T Club loved Mike's joke telling at monthly meetings. Everyone was always amazed at how he always remembered so many jokes which he could blurt out on demand and not ever miss a pun or screw up the punch line. The T Club once had an official vote to modify the T Club's by-laws to limit Mike to only two jokes per meeting. A motion was made and passed, but that still didn't stop the monthly barrage of "Mikeee" jokes that everyone despised and loved at the same time. The by-laws were often broken due to encouragement by members for "another joke, Mike!" Mike's jokes were mostly a little weird and wild, but seldom off-color. They usually could be told and enjoyed (or not enjoyed) by both men, women, and children and they were often bar, animal, drunkard, or doctor based jokes and were sometimes rightfully labeled as "sick – sick - sick!" The closest analogy for Mike's jokes were like verbal ""Far Side" or "Tundra" type jokes and most got at least a hearty giggle if not an outright belly-aching laugh!

Mike will be remembered for his jokes and his remarkable ability to remember names and faces. You couldn't go anywhere with Mike without him recognizing and introducing to you someone he personally knew. Mike & Dixie visited Betty and me while in the Navy in Bermuda over 40 years ago and he saw an acquaintance there. He knew automotive facts and body styles better than anyone we knew and could tell you what hood ornament and radiator shell design were for all cars made before 1960. He was truly a walking encyclopedia for the automotive industry – but with many pages of unforgettable jokes inserted!
