A LITTLE ROADSIDE HISTORY

Can you remember the first Burma Shave Sign you ever saw? How old do you think you were? I can't be sure, but I know that I had just learned to read and was delighted to have something on which to practice during the long drives my parents took each summer. They would drive the current family vehicle from our house in Phoenix, AZ to my Grandmother's house in Salt Lake City and then on to Maybelle, Colorado, and back to Phoenix. Boring.

What I couldn't know at the time was that I was enjoying the last decade of those little red and white signs. What began in 1927 as a brilliant advertising strategy to capture the attention of the passengers of the slower autos on the older narrower roads was no longer proving effective at higher speeds along the sides of the superhighways. One late sign set summed up the dilemma perfectly "Slow down pa/ Sakes alive/ Ma missed signs/ Four / And five / Burma shave ".

Sales were starting to level for the family-owned company and in 1963, they sold it to Philip Morris Inc., who folded it into their safety razor division, leaving the former owners, the Odells, in charge as managers. It was the Odells who made the decision to remove the nearly 35,000 individual signs without further delay. Since the signs stood on rented land and had to be maintained or they would become an embarrassment, from an advertising standpoint, if they felt into default or decay, it was determined that crews would pull them down as fast as was possible. By the end of the year, they were gone except for sets given to friends and celebrities and a set that was donated to the Smithsonian.

As a final irony, the removal of the signs generated as much publicity for the product as the signs ever had. The entire nation mourned their passing. Well into the television age, the Odells made appearances on every talk show with their favorite sets of signs and told their story of the product from its homespun beginning in 1925 and the idea of the signs in 1927, reinvigorating sales for the very old product. The fanfare surrounding the museum donation was nothing short of a phenomenon. Of course the set chosen was apocryphal: "Shaving brushes / You'll soon see 'em / On the shelf / In some / Museum / Burma Shave ".

OK, you've been thinking hard, but you still can't remember. I remember sets in western Wyoming, Utah, and Colorado particularly but not what they said. It has been too long, but they accomplished their mission—I do remember the product—Burma shave.

I'll help you out. Here' some of the best I might have seen because they were West Coast:

1959: The draftee/ Tried a tube/ and purred / well whaddya know / I've been defurred/ Burma Shave

1959: Drinking drivers / Nothing worse/ They put / The quart / Before the hearse / ${\tt Burma \ Shave}$

1960:Angels / who guard you / when you drive / usually / retire at 55 / Burma Shave

1963: Don't lose / Your head / to gain a minute / You need / Your head / Your brains are in it / Burma Shave

During their heyday, the Odells were unable to generate enough jingles, so they came up with the idea of a contest. They invited people to write their own and submit them, the winners to receive \$100. They were absolutely flooded. They had unknowingly created the first consumer survey, but all they wanted was a break from writing jingles. There was a "give no offense" rule that eliminated a lot of good ones (that we'd probably use today). The pile was sifted and sifted again until the final winners were chosen. "The other woman / In his life / said "Go back home / and scratch your wife" was vetoed
