Pres Woodrow Wilson enters WWI on April 2,1917. Henry Ford was deeply opposed to this war. In one of his folksy quotes to the *New York Times* he said, "To my mind, the word 'murderer' should be embroidered in red letters across the breast of every soldier". (1915) He went on developing farm equipment and campaigning for peace while the war raged in Europe, even organizing the ill-fated "peace ship". That vessel "sank" metaphorically into a Ford apocryphal tale.

He then came home, did a 180, and started procuring military contracts by the dozens. By 1918, he was producing everything from steel helmets to aero plane engines and gas masks at the Highland Park plant. Then the Navy deepened the River Rouge channel built a new plant in the Dearborn meadows for a new "Eagle boat". But Ford was not much of a boat builder. No Eagle boat ever went to war. However, the new plant remained—bigger and better than the old plants had ever been and with improved channel access.

He promised that he would take "not one cent of profit" from the war effort and called it "blood money". How about that promise, anyway? The US Treasury never got a dime and no one knows how much there was. Accountants have joyfully calculated it at anywhere from \$78 million by 12/1918 to \$29 million for just Henry personally. Yet the story persists that he paid—*just saying you will makes people think that you did*—*remember that. It might come in handy sometime.*

Join us for a tour through the backroads to St. Johns to see beautiful fields of bearded Iris in bloom. Please bring a dish to share for a Pot Luck picnic and bring your own beverages and dishes. There are picnic tables and chairs, public restrooms, drinking fountains, and lots of conversation available at the farm.

The iris Test Garden is located at the Jimand Janet Leifer Farm. They are in the process of cutting back on their fields this year and are offering a "you dig your own" special of all rhizomes you can get into a grocery bag for \$25. A great deal, if you are real energetic and have space in you yard to add a bed of iris.

Obviously it's because we were contemplating entering the First World War and industry had already directed itself to that effort, but at home, this shift and "war gitters" made the economy very shaky, without any sound banking system. A series of small bank "runs" and stock "crashes" and even an economic depression were harbingers of things to come. It's a little known fact that there were several depressions before "the big one" of '29. Even though we weren't "at war" in '17. President Wilson sent troops to France in June. In December, the 18th Amendment passed, allowing states to "go dry" - they were "trying times".
